This term, we have been fortunate to have Paul Gibson teaching us Music every Friday. The R-2s have been experimenting with rhythm and pitch whilst using musical instruments such as boom whackers and claves (clapping sticks). We have enjoyed working together to perform percussion songs such as Incy Wincy Spider and Uptown Funk. In Music, we have to work tough because sometimes it is hard to track the coloured music notes and play at the same time!

In Science, we have been exploring push and pull forces. Our design brief was to create a ramp to test out how items move down a ramp. We are also exploring what makes a fair test.

We made the ramps out of materials in the classroom, but we had to make sure they were strong enough to hold our items on and eventually our potato athletes. We had to accurately measure the ramp and consider the height, length and angle of it.

POTATO OLYMPICS with the R-2s





If necessary, other students can be included to top up numbers, but the intention would be to provide opportunities to those not engaged in regular sport.

Open to all schools across the Sapsasa and secondary school sport zones of Yorke Peninsula, Northern, Port Pirie, Mid North and North Eastern.

 - Modified games and/or skill development sessions across 1 or more sports
