on Channel Ten News! Our Student Leadership Team's Bake Sale was a sweet success, thanks to the efforts of our student leaders and generous support from families.



Year 5/6 Gardening

Our Year 5/6 class has been hard at work researching and building wicking beds to expand our school garden and

support sustainable growing practices. After learning about how wicking beds work to conserve water, the class eagerly got to work!



As part of the project, the learners conducted a **volume investigation**, measuring the dimensions of the garden beds and calculating the volume using the appropriate formula. This real-life maths

application helped ensure we had the correct amount of **potting mix** to fill the beds accurately—an important step in successful planting!



The 5/6s rolled up their sleeves, showing outstanding **teamwork**

and effort as they shovelled gravel, added the soil mix, and carefully set up the new garden beds. Each learner has now been assigned a bed to care for, taking responsibility for the growth and wellbeing of their plants.

We've planted a delicious variety of vegetables and herbs including butter beans, peas, spinach, beetroot, silverbeet, Italian parsley, and mint.

A huge thank you to **Derryn Stringer** for generously supplying the **gravel and soil**, **Matthew Wilkinson** for prepping the garden area for the spray shuttles, and **Glen Wilkinson** for delivering the materials to us. Your support helped bring this project to life. Thanks also to **Lynne** for helping us cover our beds with **frost cloths**, keeping them protected during chilly nights.

We are so excited to watch our garden thrive and look forward to harvesting some home-grown produce in the coming months!

Gel Printing Plates

Makes 2 x A4 Gel Printing Plates

15 minutes

Paint or ink is applied to the gel plate, spread with a brayer (roller), and then a print is transferred to paper or fabric by pressing the paper or fabric against the painted plate.



Ingredients

- 1½ cups alycerine
- 1½ cups boiling water
- 6 tablespoons gelatine

Method

- 1. In a saucepan mix glycerine with gelatine and stir well to combine.
- Add boiling water, stirring over heat until the gelatine is dissolved.
- 3. Pour the mixture into a flat container.
- 4.Use a metal spoon to push the bubbles to the side of the container, then pop them with a skewer. Work quickly as it sets as soon as it cools.
- 5.Cover with a lid.
- 6.Gel plates don't take long to become firm.
- 7. Store at room temperature away from sunlight and heat, enjoy printing!

Note: Gel plates can be broken up and re-melted in the microwave or a saucepan. They can be melted down and remade if they crack or are damaged. Use a sieve to remove flakes of paint when re-pouring them.



On Wednesday, 11th June we had a visit from Senyora Clark. The R/1/2s explored 'Worry Dolls' that originated from Guatemala. Senyora Clark let them take a mini one home and they also got to make their own! The Year 3-6 students have been learning about Spanish speaking countries. "In Spanish we made Ojo De Dios meaning Eye of God. We got told they could protect a child from evil sprits. When the child is born they would do one layer. When the child turned one their parents would do another layer, then when the child turns two they would add a third layer. Mine turned out good." Sofia



In Science we are doing a space glove investigation. We learnt that astronauts wear special gloves to protect their hands in space. Sometimes, these gloves can get damaged. It is important to fix them so astronauts can continue their work safely. In our investigation we are seeing which materials can stay airtight and waterproof in water for 30 seconds or more. There are two types of investigations we need



to do. For the first investigation we put our glove in water 30 seconds without moving it and for the second investigation in water we thread beads onto pipe cleaners while under the water. We have really enjoyed the investigation but also found it very challenging as it wasn't easy to fix as we first thought!

"My first material was sticky tape that I used to try to fix the hole in my glove. It only stayed in water for 4 seconds before it began to leak. My next material was cloth tape and that also didn't last very long in the water." – Elsie

"I love Science because we got to try fix the space glove for the astronaut. I picked bandaids first but they didn't work because the water leaked

into my glove and the bandaids floated off. My next material was rubber bands but there were too many holes for the water to get through." Logan

"I am trying to fix my space glove with super glue, duct tape and sticky tape. I predicted that the super glue would work the best but it didn't stick to the rubber glove properly. I tried duct tape and that worked well as long as I wrapped it well over the hole."- Charlie F


